4. Provide examples of when and when your viewpoint is legitimate, and of how your position varies from the opposing opinion.
5. State your point of view.

Toulmin's Arguments

The Toulmin method was developed by philosopher Stephen E. Toulmin to break down his arguments into six components. Toulmin's approach starts with three basic parts: the claim, the reasons, and the warrant. Each argument is built around these components.

A claim is a statement that writers want to substantiate in front of their audience. It is, in other words, the most important point of contention of [essay writing service](#).

The information and facts that are used to support a claim are referred to as the grounds of the argument.

Finally, the warrant, which may be inferred or expressed, is the assumption that establishes a connection between the basis and the claim.

Elements of Toulmin Argument

The six components of the Toulmin model are as follows:

1. The point at which the argument ends or the assertion that the speaker wants the audience to believe.
2. Grounds are the basis for an argument or support for a claim or defense.
3. The logic that allows the inferential jump from the grounds to the claim to be made is known as the warrant.
4. Support for the warrant is referred to as "backing."
5. The degree of confidence with which the claim is made by the advocate is referred to as its modality.
6. Exceptions to the claim may be made in the rebuttal of the claim.

Classical Argument

In persuasive writing, a classical argument is the most fundamental kind of argument that is usually employed in essays and position papers. This essay contains at least five sections: an introduction, a recounting of the events, confirmation, rebuttal, and conclusion. Traditional arguments are organized logically into their constituent components. For example, while I [write my essay](#) using classical argument style, I ensure that each part of the essay logically follows on from the one before it. It is written in this manner to facilitate transitions between ideas, particularly with the primary goal of convincing the reader or audience.

Elements of a Classic Argument:
